#### Tools of the Handy Man

I came across this article in the Old Lions "GG" newsletter which is the newsletter of the Old Boys from North Sydney Technical High School which of course was closed by the DET many years ago (hello Old Lions!). Some of you might have already come across this journal and I believe the article originally came courtesy of the ABC's "Australia All Over".

**Drill Press:** A tall upright machine useful for suddenly snatching flat metal bar out of your hands so that it smacks you in the chest and flings your beer can across the room denting the freshly painted project which you had carefully set in the corner where nothing could get to it.

**Wire Wheel:** Cleans paint off old bolts and then flicks them somewhere under your workbench with the speed of light! Also removes fingerprints and hard earned calluses from fingers at about the same time it takes to say "Oh sh-t!"

**Angle Grinder:** Portable cutting tool used to make things too short.

**Pliers:** Used to round off bolt heads. They can be used for making blood blisters.

**Belt Sander:** An electric sanding tool commonly used to convert minor "touch up" jobs into major refinishing projects.

**Hacksaw:** One of a family of cutting tools built on the Ouija Board principle – it transforms human energy into a crooked unpredictable motion and the more you attempt to influence its course, the more dismal your future becomes.
